We thought the most helpful and knowledgeable part of this training however was the panels. These help us in so many ways to be able to get answers from not just professionals, but from individuals and their families who live with hearing loss each and every day, and to be able to hear their experiences and advice on how to help our children as they grow and get older and making sure they succeed and have the resources to do so. It's always more helpful for us to hear it from people who have been in that situation and have the experience and even though every child and situation is different it's always so helpful to hear their stories whether funny, hard or sad.
